

The past several months have been exhilarating, exhausting, exciting, and very challenging.

From any perspective, HARBEL's newest program, Job Opportunities = Business Success (JOBS), is, itself, a rousing success. The result of a hard-won federal earmark granted for one year by Congress, the JOBS program registers area residents seeking employment and matches them with employers who need qualified and trained staff.



Holding workshops and a job fair, the program continues to make matches, and send applicants for training if needed. The earmark award contains funding for specialized training and educational courses to help applicants qualify for a particular job.

The JOBS program now faces a crisis, as the one year mark is reached on September 30 and the earmark expires. Congress is no longer accepting earmark requests following the political change in the November 2010 election. Therefore, the search is in high gear to replace the funding with a similar amount and allow the program to continue to help Baltimoreans find stable employment and support their families.

While balancing the needs of the JOBS program for continuity, we have not forgotten our other long-running successful programs. You are hearing progress reports this evening from the directors of our Housing, Substance Abuse Prevention, and Community Relations programs. Each director has had financial challenges to face and surmount, as funding becomes more scarce and competition for the few remaining dollars becomes stiffer. We are fortunate that our directors are seasoned leaders who have been successful in leading their programs and achieving remarkable results. We are fortunate that HARBEL's Board of Directors continues to support the efforts of the directors and remain loyal to our shared commitment of bringing the best resources to our clients.

Our foundation partners continue to exhibit confidence in our abilities and we are very grateful for their support. Just last month, our long-time partner, the Baltimore Community Foundation (BCF), awarded HARBEL an extra \$15,000 to match their previous Neighborhood Grants Initiative award.

This outstanding effort, under our Community Relations Program directed by Mike Hilliard, sets up a community-wide panel to review applications for projects submitted and carried out by the communities themselves and grants the groups the funding to complete their project. We are very appreciative of the confidence and support expressed by BCF in the enhancement of this initiative.

As everyone knows, HARBEL occupies a very visible spot along a major corridor in the city. With great thanks to DON CRIST, husband of our Executive Assistant, Sharon Crist, our visibility has been greatly enhanced and beautified with the makeover of the front garden. The old backless, uncomfortable benches have been replaced by beautiful benches with a back to lean on which makes sitting and talking much more comfortable. The dead tree has been replaced, the broken bricks removed and replaced with soft mulch, and the whole appearance is more inviting. Best yet, Don volunteered his efforts and his work and we say a big THANK YOU DON. Job very well done.

As successful as HARBEL continues to be, we do not do these things in a vacuum. We do not stand alone. We count on the interaction, participation, and support of our communities. YOU are our community, and it is for the betterment of all of our residents that we are in the office day after day trying our best to keep our neighborhoods safe, secure, and thriving. It is only with a partnership between HARBEL and the surrounding neighborhoods that we will achieve the goals in which we have each dedicated our efforts. Thank you, Northeast Baltimore, for another successful year and may we all go together from strength to strength.

HARBEL HOUSING PARTNERSHIP

Regina W. Buker, Director

The Partnership will be starting its 19th year of lessening the risk of foreclosure through our comprehensive homebuyer education and counseling services.



Home Buyer Workshops

In 1993, HARBEL Housing conducted three homebuyer workshops, serving 73 buyers. This year, I anticipate that more than 1,300 people will have attended one of our 49-homebuyer workshops. This represents a 17% increase over the number attending last year, and will bring our total number of people served through our homebuyer workshops to 13,000 people.

More than 50% of the individuals attending made our workshop their first-step in the home buying process. Lessening the risk of foreclosure, because they receive education on the mortgage process and options, house hunting and contract negotiation steps, budget and savings information, and credit repair, before they speak to a lender or agent.

Pre-Settlement Workshops

Three years ago, HARBEL began to offer a pre-settlement workshop. The three-hour course educates the buyer on what they will face as a new homeowner. Topics cover settlement day, home safety, energy tips, home maintenance, repair, and improvement, along with when and when not to refinance.

Many people who are losing their home now, made bad decisions after the purchase when they chose to refinance their initial mortgage. This workshop is a valuable tool in lessening the risk of foreclosure.

Counseling Services

HARBEL Housing provides both pre-purchase and credit counseling. These one-on-one counseling sessions focus on the individual needs of the client. With pre-purchase counseling, our counselors look at the readiness to purchase and any red-flags that the client should resolve before submitting a contract offer.

The credit counseling provides suggestions to the client, so that they can lower their debt, improve the credit score, and increase savings, which is necessary to build a solid foundation when they purchase a home.

Requests for counseling services were very low during the beginning of our year, but in just March and April, our staff has counseled 100 people. I anticipate that more than 400 sessions will be held this year.

New Homeowners

Each month HARBEL is receiving word that more people are buying a home. In April, 28 of our clients purchased a home. With numbers increasing each month, it is difficult to predict what our final number of new homeowners will be by the end of June. But, it will be more than last year's number of 148 homes.

What I'm seeing is an increase in the average sale price of the homes our clients are purchasing. That's a good sign. I'm anxious to see our final numbers after June 30 when I begin to complete our year-end report.


At last year's annual meeting, I discussed the potential cuts in funding for pre-purchase housing counseling. While HARBEL Housing did face a loss of \$14,000 in our governmental funding and lost one of our financial partners when the bank was acquired by another partner... HARBEL Housing was able to maintain our four staff people and increase the number of people we served. This year our program will end with a deficit.

In light of anticipated Congressional budget action – I have a grave concern regarding major reductions in funding for pre-purchase housing counseling programs. We could be facing a loss of \$20,000 or more dollars and that would significantly impact our ability to provide foreclosure prevention services of pre-purchase education and counseling.

It is imperative that our community residents in our community contact their elected representatives – today – and tell them how critical the continued funding of HARBEL Housing is to the viability of our communities through lessening the risk of foreclosure.

Without strong support for pre-purchase counseling services --- our Country will continue to be in a foreclosure crisis, the value of our housing stock will stay low and not recover, and more importantly more families will lose their home.

Please help HARBEL Housing in our plea and make your voices heard. Thank you.



HARBEL PREVENTION AND RECOVERY CENTER

HARBEL Prevention and Recovery Center provides outpatient services to adults and adolescents who are in need of substance abuse treatment. It is the mission of the program to provide effective services that assist individuals in reducing and eliminating the harm caused by substance abuse. Services are provided to uninsured Baltimore City residents, Baltimore County and Baltimore City residents with Medicaid/Health Choice and Primary Adult care (PAC) coverage, and persons whose private insurance (such as Blue Cross/Blue Shield/ Carefirst /United) covers our services.




As a result of policy changes and cuts in the state/local budgets to grant programs that were made at the state and local levels ,the program has begun to provide many of our services on a fee for service basis. This is a business model that is much different then when most persons who receive services are able to access grant funds to pay for services. Although switching to a fee for service model does make treatment access for persons who want to enter treatment more challenging, it has begun to provide an economic base for the program to remain viable/economically feasible in today's economy. Although we have fewer treatment slots for persons who are uninsured, the agency has been able to help many uninsured persons become eligible for PAC and Medicaid, and have been able to open up some of our services to Baltimore County residents also. Although we have lost some of our capacity for treating the uninsured, the program has expanded our capacity to treat clients with medical assistance, PAC, and private insurance.

Even as we are now doing more fee for service work, the agency is still serving as a safety net for uninsured Baltimore City residents who need substance abuse treatment. HARBEL Prevention and Recovery is pleased to announce that we have successfully bid on funds to continue working with city residents who are uninsured AND to expend our services to also include a more intensive outpatient level of care. After a very competitive process (made even more competitive as a result of state/local budget cuts), HARBEL Prevention and Recovery Center was just awarded 56 adult treatment slots for the uninsured as well as 6 new slots for starting intensive outpatient services. This newly announced award is in addition to continued grant funding for adolescent and school-based services. HARBEL Prevention and Recovery thanks Baltimore Substance Abuse Systems for their recognition of our abilities and their funding of these recently awarded slots!

HARBEL Prevention and Recovery Center anticipates moving forward with the opening of a new level of care-intensive outpatient services- in the near future. Intensive outpatient services differ from the current level of care that we offer as this level of care requires that the person participate in more treatment sessions per week- a minimum of 9 hours of services per week. Currently, we turn away persons who need more service than we offer in standard outpatient, so adding this level of care will allow us to better serve persons who need more intensive treatment in order to stabilize their lives. Intensive outpatient services, upon receipt of needed insurance authorizations, will be provided to Medicaid recipients, PAC insured, some persons with private insurance, and uninsured Baltimore City residents

I would like to thank the staff of HARBEL Prevention and Recovery Center- staff has had to learn many new skills and respond to the many changes that have been essential to becoming a fee for service program. The efforts of everyone on staff – whether in writing a treatment plan for an insurance company, tracking an authorization and setting up a billing process, or entering data- has been crucial during this transition year. Thank you for your continued dedication to helping HARBEL Prevention and Recovery Center thrive!



COMMUNITY RELATIONS

HARBEL's purpose is: "To unite organizations in order to define and solve those problems common to the community." In the past year we have done precisely that.

The communities of Northeast Baltimore have learned that problematic liquor establishments can severely affect a neighborhood's quality of life.

In the past year, we have spent considerable effort in assisting our member associations in dealing with liquor establishments who have chosen to operate in a disruptive fashion. We assisted the Valley Park Community Association in preparing for and attending two hearings before the Board of Liquor License Commissioners in which the community protested the operation of Goodfellas at 4919 Belair Rd. This effort resulted in a 30-day suspension of the establishment's license and a \$3,500 fine. We have assisted the Cedmont Community Improvement Association and the East Rosemont Community Association in fighting the appeal of JT's at 6317 Belair Rd to provide live entertainment at that location. That appeal was dismissed by the Board of Municipal Zoning Appeals. We also supported Cedmont in its protest of the renewal of JT's liquor license. That protest resulted in a comprehensive community agreement with the licensee that provides the community with significant leverage in dealing with the establishment in the future. We supported the North Harford Road Community Association's protest of the liquor license for Monarchs at 6832 Harford Rd., and that protest also resulted in a community agreement with that licensee that should ensure far less



disruptive operation of the establishment. We also drafted and facilitated the negotiation of community agreements between the East Rosemont Community Association with Six Pax n More at 6622 Belair Rd. and the Cedmont Community Improvement Association and the Glenham-Belhar Community Association with the Hub Cap Inn at 6001 Belair Rd. We feel that our efforts in dealing with problematic liquor establishments will make our member communities safer and better places to live.

HARBEL has again been privileged to receive a \$15,000 grant from the Baltimore Community Foundation to be utilized for community improvement projects in Northeast Baltimore. This funding has been allocated by a Neighborhood Allocation Committee composed of community members who were nominated to serve on the committee by our various community presidents. This hard working group of community leaders have already met and evaluated grant applications from many of our communities. They have picked the best projects to fund, and the awards they have made are now at work making our neighborhoods even better places in which to live.

What I have described above are our significant successes since June of 2010, but as anyone who has done community work knows, what really impacts a neighborhood's quality of life is consistently dealing with the myriad of small problems that on a daily basis affects the community's stability. On a daily basis we at HARBEL assist residents and community leaders in dealing with issues pertaining to crime, sanitation, zoning, transportation, and housing code violations that frequently confront our communities, and by dealing with those small problems on a daily basis we help our communities to be great places to live, earn, learn and play.

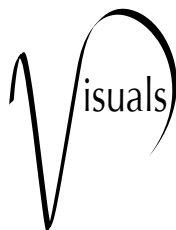
